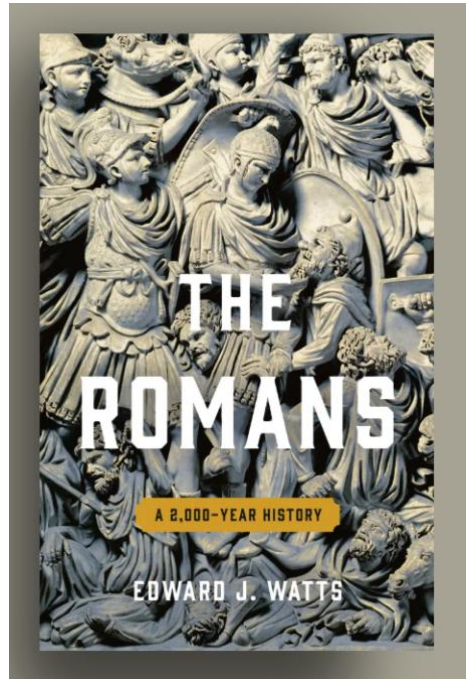
**ix** -Reusing Pages of Books | Variant Readings

Parts of ancient books were recycled in a variety of different ways, but I don't recall having seen anything quite like this before. It's a portion of a parchment folium from a codex that contained some works of Demosthenes (P.Amh. 2 24, TM 59644). What we have here is the top of a column containing the beginning of the second Philippic with a title at the top: κ<sup>τ</sup> φιλιπποῦ β. It was cut from a folium of a two-column codex and then notched across the top edge and part of the left edge. It is a little strange, then, that it seems to be torn rather than cut at the bottom.
