**1. Visitors to the archaeological site will *enter and exit from the entrance on Thissio Square* (or Jacqueline de Romy Square) on the pedestrian street of Apostolic Pavlos, where the ticket office was recently renovated.**

**2. Due to the distance between the Stoa of Attalos Museum and the temporary entrance to the archaeological site on Thissio Square, *from Tuesday, July 1, 2025 until the completion of the work*, visitors to the archaeological site will enter and exit half an hour before the specified opening hours (Ministry of Culture and Tourism No. 127080)**

**3. The main entrance to the archaeological site on *Adrianou Street* is **expected to reopen to the public by the end of 2025**, following the completion of the works of Phase 3 of the Agora-Kerameikos TAA project.**
